Chairman Callahan called the meeting to order at 5:02pm.

**2. Approval of Minutes for**

**5. New Business:**

a. Department Reports: ***Department Reports Accepted as presented.***

1. Police ..... Police Chief Smith

Police Chief Smith summarized recent department activities for August based on 250 calls for service, 201 reports written, 89 traffic stops, 1 fatal accident on interstate, 3 fraud cases, 1 animal cruelty, 1 vicious dog, 2 assaults, 4 break ins, 7 vandalisms, 6 disturbances, a few trial cases, 2 drug cases, a couple DUI's, 2 non-injury accidents, 1 restraining order violation and 9 welfare checks.

2. Code Enforcement..... Kody Ryan

Kody summarized recent department activities for September based on 12 dogs at large calls, 7 citizen complaints and 8 grass complaints. August - 7 citations, 5 dog at large complaints, 2 dog at large as a nuisance. 1 junk vehicle tow, 1 dog bite, 1 vicious dog at shelter.

3. Fire..... Fire Chief Pierson

Fire Chief summarized recent department activities for August based on 7 calls for service. 2 vehicle accidents, 1 minor, 1 rollover fatality. Grass fire at the Fairgrounds was caused from a down powerline, 1 false alarm – call for grass fire as citizen was burning some grass, was told not to let it out of control or out of the fire. 1 structure fire at the fairgrounds due to faulty electrical covenant of the building. 2 gas leaks call, one was a pilot light for a water heater, the other was a from a trench in the alleyway off of Milwaukee ST. Northwestern had just finished working on the gas line, Northwestern was unable to find the leak, a thorough investigation was complete. The meters were going crazy, but no findings of a leak were ever found. The gas odor ended up disappearing. Multi- Agency Hazmat Training was complete with the railroad, however only around 20 people showed up. There will be a fire truck hose training coming up within the next week.

4. County Health Report.....Ida Miller, Absent, report in packet.

Child Safety: Powell County Public Health has car seats available on a sliding scale basis and a trained child seat technician to help with installation and questions.

Public Health Office: The Powell County Public Health Office has regularly scheduled office hours every Thursday from 11am to 2pm. The office is on the lowest level of the courthouse in Suite 106.

Animal bites: 2 animal bites were reported. 2 Rabies cases submitted to the State by the Vet Clinic.

Ticks: Different species carry different types of disease, in Montana the main species of tick we worry about are the black-legged tick or deer tick and the American dog tick. Those are the ones that carry diseases of the most concern to us right now, including Lyme diseases of the most concern to us right now, including Lyme disease which only deer ticks carry, and Rocky Mountain spotted fever which is carried by the dog tick.

Hantavirus: Outbuildings and other enclosed spaces may harbor rodents and can lead to potential exposure to hantavirus. Appropriate precautions should be used when evidence of rodents is visible. In Montana, the deer mouse can cause Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome.

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza: While not detected in Powell County, precautions should be taken such as gloves when handling game birds or any sick or dead bird that must be handled for disposal. People are encouraged to report unusual or unexplained cases of sickness and/or death of domestic or wild birds to their veterinarian or public health at 406-691-0242.

Mosquitos: The most commonly identified disease caused by mosquitos in Montana is the West Nile virus which can affect humans. Draining standing water, dressing in light colors with loose layers, and defending by using mosquito repellent will help lessen mosquito impact.

b. Adopting a New Police Department Policy Manual – Jordan/Chief Smith

The Police Department Policy Manual is created by Lexipol, a leading firm in Police Department Policy creation. It is an update to the current, but outdated, Policy Manual. It provides Police Officers with readily accessible information on department policies, state statute, personal, and operations and is used by officers to perform their functions based on established legal authority.

The committee discussed the approval of the adoption of the new DLPD Policy Manual.

Chairman Callahan motioned to forward the New Police Department Policy Manual to the City Council. Member Kersch seconded the motion. 3 Ayes, 0 Nos, motion carried to be passed to City Council for approval.

c. Deer Lodge Police Department Shooting Range – Jordan/Chief Smith

The Deer Lodge Police Department proposed creating a practice shooting range on the City property at Emery Road that can be used by both DLPD and Powell County Sheriffs Department. Currently, both departments use the shooting range at the old Mastodon site. The proposal is to fund and construct incremental improvements to the shooting range over the coming years.

The committee discussed the approval of the design, and implementation of the Deer Lodge Police Department Shooting Range.

Chairman Callahan motioned to table the agenda item, until Chief Smith can put together some Preliminary Costs Report, pros, cons, and gather opinions of nearby neighbors. Member Kersch seconded the motion. 3 Ayes, 0 Nos. Motion to table passed.

d. Discuss Request by ReAct Group to Review Smoking in Front of Businesses - Jordan

At the August 10, 2023 Public Health and Safety Meeting, 3 members of the ReAct Coalition presented survey results to the Committee regarding smoking and vaping in front of businesses in tow. They requested the Committee review local ordinances pertaining to the Clean Indoor Air Act in an attempt to remove smoking/vaping from in front of City businesses.

A survey was conducted throughout the City, the results are not present at this current meeting. There were around 250 respondents on the survey. There are currently no regulations on smoking/vaping in front of businesses.

Member Kersch motioned to invite the coalition back to the next meeting, putting the agenda on the next meeting, and to further investigate the Clean Air Act and to see what the limitations are and what the City is able to do. Chairman Callahan seconded the motion. 3 Ayes, 0 Nos, motion passed.

Interim Chairman Kersch called the meeting to order at 5:00pm.

**4. Old Business:**

- a. Title 8 Ordinance: Dogs – Jordan

The City Council recommended that the Committee review the ordinance for additional comments.

Ida - All animal bite situations involving a human are immediately reported to a local health officer. A good recommendation to the City Council would be to add both (A). and (B.) into the ordinances current code.

- i. Anybody who has responded to a dog bite or animal bite, reports such bite to a physician and to the local health officer and animal control.*

- ii. *Any individual that responds to a dog bite on an individual needs to report said bite to the local health officer and DPHHS.*

The mayor requested that in the definition section of restraint be clarified to state the following: 1. Dog must be on a leash. 2. Dog must respond to a competent person's commands. Add the definition of a competent person as follows: A competent person is a person that is able to control an animal under their care.

The code states that a vicious animal is only defined as the animal that is attacking a human being.

Discussion on dog-on-dog violence proceeded and the Committee concluded that a vicious dog is a dog that is attacking another dog or a human being. It was decided to combine the codes in a reference as follows:

Add a sentence on to A stating: *"The same procedure applies to animals that are vicious as defined by 8.04.06 – an animal that viciously attacks another animal or person."*

Add the definition of a vicious animal as defined in section 8.04.06

Change the Title for Section 8.02.19 to *"Procedures for Vicious Dogs."*

Interim Chairman Kersch motioned to recommend these changes to the City Council. Member Fjelstad seconded the motion. 2 Ayes, 0 Nos, 1 Absent. Motion carried forward to City Council.

## 5. **New Business:**

### a. Department Reports: ***Department Reports Accepted as presented.***

#### 1. Police ..... Police Chief Smith

Police Chief Smith summarized recent department activities for October based on 194 calls for service, 126 reports written, and 55 traffic stops. Highlighted calls 1 pursuit and eluding. 2 MIPs and 5 curfew violations.

DLPD assisted in investigations and arrests of several individuals during 2 separate incidents that resulted in the seizure of approximately ½ pound of methamphetamine, over 1,100 fentanyl pills, \$25,000 in cash, several stolen firearms and a stolen vehicle.

#### 2. Code Enforcement..... Kody Ryan

Kody summarized recent department activities for October based on 12 dogs at large calls, 10 citizen complaints, 192 year-to-date dog tags issued, 1 dog sheltered, 1 junk vehicle towed, one vicious dog detained at shelter pending court ruling and 1 stop work order issued.

#### 3. Fire..... Fire Chief Pierson

Fire Chief summarized recent department activities for October based on 5 calls for service. 1 structure fire – fire was contained in the bedroom origin.

2 Separate Semi Truck fires one on each side of town.

1 false alarm for a false alarm at a house.

1 Hit and Run from a Semi, it was pulled over, just a lot of snow so the truck was missed.

Engine One has a check Engine light on and an alarm going off. A mechanic is down, a DEF part is around 90 days out, the truck may not run on full function until it derates.

Tenner 1 was sent to Missoula for a fuel line to be replaced as a recall. There should be no invoice as it was supposed to be done under warranty for a total recall.

#### 4. County Health Report.....Ida Miller

Child Safety: Powell County Public Health has car seats available on a sliding scale basis and a trained child seat technician to help with the installation and questions. At October's car seat event, 8 children were served, and 5 car seats were given away.

Public Health Office: The Powell County Public Health office has regularly scheduled office hours every Thursday from 11 am to 2 pm. The office is on the lowest level of the courthouse in Suite 106.

COVID-19: There were 30 cases of COVID -19 reported in October. Currently 2 active cases for October.

Animal bites: 2 animal bites were reported in September.

Influenza: October 1, 2023, is the start of influenza in Montana. Immunizations are available at Deer Lodge Medical Center (DLMC), Heidi Applegate's office, and Safeway. Influenza (also known as "flu") is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death.

Hantavirus: Take appropriate precautions when working around rodent infested outbuildings. The most important hantavirus in the United States that can cause Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome is spread by the deer mouse here in Montana.

Accidental Gun Shot Wound, 2 high speed pursuits, DLPD vehicles unable to keep up. DUI crash into house, exterior damage to the house, 2 trespassing calls,

5 traffic accidents, 2 runaway juvenile calls, officer located. 3 harassment calls, elderly person victim of fraud, and 1 death notification.

2. Code Enforcement..... Kody Ryan

Kody summarized recent department activities for February based on 10 dogs at large calls, 16 citizen complaints, 1 temporary foster, and 195 year-to-date dog tags issued. 1 dog at shelter, 2 citations issued, once vicious dog detained at shelter, pending court ruling, 1 stop work order, 2 beaver dams ripped out, begin culvert inspections and clearing.

3. Fire..... Fire Chief Pierson

Fire Chief summarized recent department activities for February based on 4 calls for service. 2 False alarms, one due to steam that was presumed to be smoke. One was a man starting up a wood stove that was thought to be a garage on fire by another resident. 1 piece of logging equipment on fire. Workers had the fire mostly out when the Fire Department arrived. Hot spots were put out before leaving the scene. 1 call for use of gas sniffer in a home. Resident was experiencing some carbon monoxide poisoning symptoms and wanted to see if our detector sensed any in the home. No gas was found.

Happenings – Engine 1 has a check engine light on. The Fire Department is running the engine as it should be okay for a while, but the part is still a couple of weeks out.

4. County Health Report.....Ida Miller

Child Safety: Powell County Public Health has car seats available on a sliding scale basis and a trained child seat technician to help with installation and questions. We gave one car seat away in November.

Public Health Office: The Powell County Public Health office has regularly scheduled office hours every Thursday from 11am to 2pm. The office is on the lowest level of the courthouse in Suite 106.

Animal bites: 0 animal bites were reported in November by the veterinarians.

Influenza: Immunizations are available at Deer Lodge Medical Center (DLMC), Heidi Applegate's office, and Safeway. Influenza (also known as "flu") is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. October 1, 2023 is the start of influenza season. There have been 5 laboratory-verified cases of influenza in Powell County, 1 case is crossed with covid. We are expecting an increase as winter progresses.

Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) is also a virus common at this time of year. It is the leading cause of bronchitis and pneumonia and is especially serious to infants, small children, and the elderly. Between influenza, COVID, and RSV, RSV is the most prevalent positively reported lab currently in Powell County.

COVID-19: There were 18 cases of COVID-19 reported in November. Currently 6 active cases for October.

Testing for Covid-19 Montana Public Health Laboratory will no longer provide free testing for Covid-19. Testing is still available at DLMC and Heidi Applegate's office.

Vaccinations are available, and the CDC is recommending the bivalent booster for anyone aged 50 and over if you have received the recommended previous vaccinations. Over 60 percent of eligible adults over 30 have been vaccinated.

**4. Old Business:**

- a. Title 8 Dogs at Large Language - Jordan

Dogs at large were discussed at the last meeting. The same language was recommended to the City Council, who then sent the language back to committee.

Definition for vicious animals currently states:

- 1. A vicious animal is an animal that bites or attempts to bite any human being without provocation, or which harasses, chases, bites or attempts to bite any other animal. The term ANIMAL includes all livestock and any domestic pet; or
- 2. Has ever been trained for fighting or has ever been owned, kept or harbored for the purpose of fighting.



Members of the City Council felt that part 2 is inappropriate because there have been cases where fighting dogs have been fully rehabilitated. Discussion to take the second clause out proceeded.

Member Fjelstad motioned to strike Clause 2 under definition of vicious animals from Title 8; member Hayes seconded the motion. 3 Ayes, 0 Nos, motion passed to send the draft to the Council for approval of the change in February.

1. Police ..... Police Chief Smith

Police Chief Smith summarized recent department activities for December based on 191 calls for service, 142 reports generated, 68 traffic stops and 19 Citations issued. 4 Welfare Checks, 2 unattended deaths, 10 medical assists, 2 suicidal individuals, 6 threats/harassments, 1 ID Theft, 2 DUI's, 2 trespassing, 6 Unwanted Persons, 3 Domestic Disturbances, and 1 Drug Case.

2. Code Enforcement..... Kody Ryan

**Frostbite:** A concern when outside in cold temperatures. **Limit time outdoors in cold, wet, or windy weather.** Pay attention to weather forecasts and wind chill readings. In very cold, windy weather, exposed skin can develop frostbite in a matter of minutes. Signs of frostbite include cold skin and a prickly feeling followed by numbness and color changes to the skin.

**§ 8.02.200 KENNELS PROHIBITED.**

(A) No kennels shall be lawful within the corporate limits of the city, except for those established, licensed and operating immediately prior to the passage of this chapter on June 6, 1977.

(B) No residence shall keep, own or harbor more than two dogs over the age of six months without obtaining an excessive dogs permit, which allows up to five dogs over the age of six months.
